CHARLES RENFRO

FAIA, Partner Diller Scofidio + Renfro (NYC)

Charles Renfro joined Diller Scofidio + Renfro (DS+R) in 1997 and became a Partner in 2004. He led the design and construction of the studio's first concert hall outside of the US - The Tianjin Juilliard School in China - as well as the studio's first public park outside of the US -Zaryadye Park in Moscow. Charles has also led the design of much of DS+R's academic portfolio, with projects completed at Stanford University, UC Berkeley, Brown University, the University of Chicago, and the recently completed Columbia Business School. Charles is also leading the design of two projects in his native Texas: the renovation of Frank Lloyd Wright's Kalita Humphreys Theater in Dallas, and Sarofim Hall, a new home for Rice University's Visual Arts department in Houston. Charles is a board member of BOFFO, a nonprofit organization that supports the work of queer LGBTQ+ BIPOC artists and designers. He has twice been recognized with the "Out100" list, and also distinguished as a notable LGBTQ leader by Crain's New York Business. He is a faculty member of the School of Visual Arts.





ROSINA DE MARIA

Principal Woods Bagot (Adelaide SA)

Rosina di Maria, MDIA, is an Interior Designer and Chair of Woods Bagot's Adelaide studio. She received her Bachelor of Interior Design from the University of South Australia in 2000 and joined Woods Bagot in 2003. Working as a Global Workplace leader, Rosina has worked around the world in Dubai, the UK, Russia, and across Europe and Asia. She returned to her hometown of Adelaide after leading the interiors portfolio in the Woods Bagot London studio.

Rosina is a Board Member of the JamFactory and Carclew Youth Arts. She has also been a national judge for multiple industry design awards including the inaugural Property Council of Australia Innovation & Excellence Awards.





NADER TEHRANI

FAIA, Founder NADAAA (Boston MA)

Nader Tehrani is Founding Principal of NADAAA, a Boston-based design practice. Born in London, he was raised in Pakistan, South Africa, Iran, and the United States. Nader received his BFA and BArch degrees from the Rhode Island School of Design, continued his studies at the Architectural Association in London and Rome, and received his Master's in Architecture and Urban Design from Harvard University's GSD in 1991. He is the former Dean of The Irwin S. Chanin School of Architecture at The Cooper Union. The works of Nader Tehrani have been widely exhibited at MOMA, LA MOCA and ICA Boston, and his work is part of the permanent collection of the Canadian Center for Architecture and the Nasher Sculpture Center.

For his contributions to architecture as an art, Nader Tehrani is the recipient of The American Academy of Arts and Letters' 2020 Arnold W. Brunner Memorial Prize, the highest form of recognition of artistic merit in The United States. Tehrani has also been named the 2022 Design Visionary by Cooper Hewitt, Smithsonian Museum of Design National Design Awards, for his innovation and impact on the field of architecture.





JOHN WARDLE

Founder Wardle Studio (Melbourne VIC))

John Wardle established his architectural practice, John Wardle Architects (now Wardle) in Melbourne in 1986 and has led the growth of the practice from working on small domestic dwellings to university building, museums, and large commercial offices. In 2001, he received his Master of Architecture at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT) and has been Adjunct Professor at the School of Art, Architecture and Design at the University of South Australia.

In 2020, Wardle was awarded the Australian Institute of Architects' Gold Medal. The Jury citation reads, in part, "John Wardle is an architect's architect...a designer of consummate skill, whose works – from the smallest intricate piece of joinery to complex high-rise buildings receive detailed attention and conscientious formal experiment."





WILLIAM **SHARPLES**

Principal SHoP (NYC)

William Sharples is a founding principal of SHoP. He applies a background in engineering to more than 30 years of industry leadership in design and master planning, working in complex, urban contexts to create dynamic projects that transform communities. William holds a Bachelor of Engineering from Pennsylvania State University and a Master of Architecture from Columbia University. His SHoP projects include New York City's East River Waterfront, the Botswana Innovation Hub in Gaborone, Collins Arch in Melbourne, Atlassian HQ in Sydney, Hudson's Site in Detroit, and a portfolio of long-term high-profile work around the world as the recipient of a Design Excellence contract with the State Department's Bureau of Overseas Building Operations (OBO). Beyond the studio, William has earned a reputation as a leader for his generation of architects and a powerful advocate for design quality and the importance of continued process innovation in contemporary construction. In 2018 he Co-Founded Assembly OSM, a modular company that delivers architecturally distinctive high-rise buildings through a technologically advanced process of digital design, manufacturing, assembly, and on-site installation.





DOMENIC ALVARO

Principal Woods Bagot (Sydney NSW)

Domenic Alvaro is Director and Global Design Leader at Woods Bagot's Sydney studio. He received his BArch from the University of South Australia in 1993, and joined Woods Bagot in 2000. With three decades of experience leading the design of projects in Australia, Europe & Asia, he has been described as "one of the industry's most original thinkers". From concept to completion, Domenic ensures that a project's narrative breathes life and personality throughout – resulting in outcomes that are surprising and delightful.

Domenic's notable projects includes the international competitionwinning scheme for landmark workplace precinct 55 Pitt Street, and the Ivy, winner of the AIA's National Award for Urban Design and the AIA Harry Seidler Award. He has recently won World Architecture Festival Awards in the House of the Year and Best Offices categories.
