Peter Stutchbury is the founder and Principal of Peter Stuchbury Architecture and has practiced in Australia since 1981. Peter graduated in architecture from the University of Newcastle in 1978, but a lifetime of formative early education in the desert of Western NSW nurtured an understanding of land and sky patterns. Since establishing his practice, Peter has received unprecedented recognition in residential architecture, as well as honors in public, commercial, heritage and sustainable projects.

Peter is currently a 'teaching master' with the Architecture Foundation Australia and was a professor at the University of Newcastle from 1999 to 2019, where he received the alumni medal in 2005. He was honored with the Australian Institute of Architects' Gold Medal in 2015, and an Honorary International Fellowship from the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA) in 2016.

His work spans several continents, including his early work in Papua New Guinea, prompting the Gold Medal jury to note "Stutchbury's unique landscapes and study of indigenous responses to the creation of shelter in varying environmental conditions...masters the art of creating architecture that speaks of the place it inhabits."

Founder, Sean Godsell Architects (Melbourne)

Sean Godsell is the founder of Sean Godsell Architects. He received his BArch from the University of Melbourne in 1984, and subsequently travelled and worked in Japan, Europe, and the UK. He later earned his MArch from the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology (RMIT) in 1999. He is currently Adjunct Professor of Architecture at Deakin University. His work has been published in the world's leading Architectural journals and he has lectured and exhibited in the USA, UK, China, Japan, India, France, Finland, Germany, Italy and New Zealand as well as across Australia. His Vatican Chapel for the 2018 Venice Architectural Biennale – which received the Papal Silver Medal - is on permanent display on the island of St Giorgio Maggiore in Venice. Sean is a Life Fellow of the Australian Institute of Architects and in 2022 was honored with the AlA's Gold Medal. The jury noted that he "has contributed significantly by expressing, on a global stage, an architectural response to Australia's unique landscape."
